




# Creating Projects from 'Scratch'

The boys in Ms Redmond's 6<sup>th</sup> class have been working with a programming software called Scratch this term. Scratch educates students on the fundamentals of computer science, programming and coding. The boys completed a 2-week intensive workshop, learning about the basics of coding and then worked to create a project based on Climate Change. Some boys created interactive fact-based

stories and others created games or challenges based on saving the world from the effects of climate change. The boys engaged excellently with the project and they worked together to fix any 'bugs' or 'glitches' that they encountered. As their stories and games developed, the boys made their projects more interesting by adding scores, time variables and sound effects, to name but a few. The students then presented these projects, informing us of how they came up with their concept, what problems they ran into and how they overcame them. The other boys then gave feedback on each project and the boys worked to improve their projects even more. The boys thoroughly enjoyed this digital project and the high standard of the projects proved just how engaged and skilled the boys were at immersing themselves into a new initiative such as coding.
